Before excavation can be made, the pool plans must receive the official approval of the state board of health. The plans are now in Portland and approval of the health board is expected some time within the next 30 days.

Columbia Is Having More Accidents, Said

Secretary of State Shows May Record; Slips One Cog from Previous Place

Chalking up big decreases in traffic accidents, injuries and fatalities during the month of May, many Oregon counties continued to improve their 1938 safety records, Secretary of State Earl Snell reported this week. May was the first month since 1935 when decreases in all three departments were recorded.

Columbia county took sixth place among the state's ten Group I counties on the basis of improvement over the first five months of 1937 in traffic accidents, injuries and deaths. Last month this county ranked fifth in this group.

Secretary Snell has divided the state's 36 counties into four groups on the basis of population density in order to make accurate comparison of accident experience. Counties in this group are Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington, Portland, Clatsop, Columbia, Yamhill, Marion, Benton and Polk in the order of their ranking.

Deschutes county led Group III for the fifth consecutive month, remaining the only county to hold top place in its class for the entire year to date. Multnomah county, exclusive of Portland, took the lead in Group I from Clackamas county, while Coos county moved from second up to the first place in Group II.

Counties which have made reductions in accidents, injuries and fatalities include Clackamas, the city of Portland, Multnomah, Coos and Deschutes.

Grangers to Compete in Safety Contest

Essays to Be Devised Covering Oregon's Problem of Cutting Accidents

Members of subordinate granges throughout the state will compete in the 1938 traffic safety essay contest being sponsored currently by the Oregon State Grange and the safety division of the department of state, according to Secretary of State Earl Snell.

Three cash awards and an additional trophy for the first prize winner have been made available by Snell. Announcements of the contest were mailed to grangers throughout the state this week.

"With increasing travel upon our highways, it is important that everyone become more careful in his driving," said Ray W. Gill, state grange master, in commenting on the contest. "I urge all grange members who are entitled to do so to submit essays in this competition. I also suggest that completed essays be read at grange meetings."

Mrs. G. W. Thiessen of Milwaukie, lecturer for the state grange, will be in charge of the contest, and all entries must be mailed to her not later than midnight August 10, 1938. Gill and Mrs. Thiessen will select three judges for the competition.

Roadside Timber Should Be Saved

Virgin timber stands, as well as some second growth and burned areas, along the heavily travelled and secondary roads of Oregon can be saved for posterity at a cost of but \$3,001,201 for the heavy travelled roads and \$900,000 for light travel roads, it is declared in a report, "Preservation of Oregon Roadside Timber," just issued by the Oregon State Planning board.

The report sounds a vigorous warning to citizens of Oregon, a warning that must be heeded if this great asset is to be saved, the figures show. It is the first complete survey made of the roadside timber situation.

The report shows that but 47.6 percent., or \$1,428,540 of the heavy travel road total and but 30 percent., or \$236,040 of the light travelled portion would have to be paid by the state. The U. S. National Forest, under the board's proposal, would pay \$924,790, or 30.8 percent. of the heavy and 56 percent. or \$435,375 of the light travelled section, while \$649,880 or 21.6 percent. of the heavy and \$104,810 or 14 percent. of the light travelled roads is allocated to the O. and C. Exchange.
