Would Regulate—

Regulation of picketing and boycotting by labor groups, and protection to agriculture in the harvesting, processing and marketing of farm products are sought in a farm-sponsored measure which will go on the general election ballot next November. This was assured Tuesday when initiative petitions bearing approximately 28,000 signatures were filed with Secretary of State Earl Snell by Howard L. Shoemaker of Hood River, president of the Associated Farmers of Oregon.

In Hillsboro—

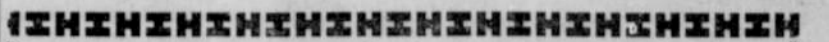
Mr. and Mrs. Bill Briot and son Billy, spent the Fourth in Hillsboro.

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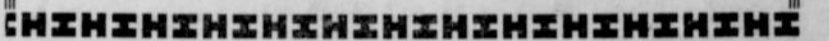
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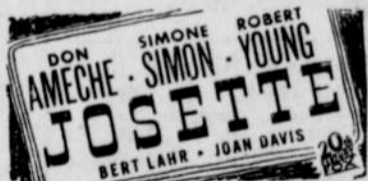
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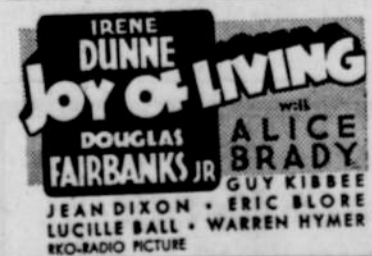
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
