JAIL WPA PROJECT APPLICATION FILED--

On Tuesday Judge J. B. Wilkerson signed application to the PWA for its participation in cost of the proposed new jail and office rooms for the courthouse and the application was forwarded to the administrator in Portland. It was necessary for J. E. Doughty who drew original plans, to make some revision which provided changes in the heating plant and some other government requirements.

As now approved by the county court, plans call for an expenditure of \$34,000 which includes the cost of the addition, heating, plumbing and the jail fixtures. If the application of the county is approved, the PWA will supply 45 per cent of the cost or \$15,230 while the county will have as its share 55 per cent or \$18,770.

The Portland office of the PWA has looked with favor on the county's application and officials believe it will be approved within 30 days. If so, then bids will be advertised for and that required 15 days. Should bids come within Mr. Doughty's estimate, the court will award a contract and possibly work may be started on the structure about October 1. It will take comparatively short time, Doughty said, to erect the building and place the roof and should bad weather come it will not interfere with the inside work.

SAVES PEA CROP--

Paul Borlin of the Cloverhill Dairy was determined not to lose the pea crop on his 40-acre planting even if old Juke seemed to be asleep so he rigged up a pump and pipe to a nearby lake and each day the pea vines get water by flooding the tract. Several hundred feet of pipe reach all parts of the tract. Although in operation less than a week, the peas show the result of more moisture and Borlin believes he will have an average crop. The peas, after being threshed, will be sent to the Longview cannery and the vines used for ensilage.
