### St. Helens--

#### COUNCIL DISCUSSES PLANS OF NEW CITY JAIL

Tentative plans for the building of the new city jail were discussed at a meeting of the St. Helens city council Monday evening. Roy Harrington, chairman of the police commission of the council, is in charge of the project which is being built at a cost of approximately \$2200.  
Present plans call for a building about 26x18 with a "shake-down" room 8x10 feet. Accommodations will be for 10 men and four women or juveniles. J. E. Doughty, local architect, is drawing up the final plans which will probably be ready for local contractors bids by the end of the week. Approximately 60 days will be required for the work. The building will be erected on the recently acquired lot adjacent to the fire station.

#### LOCAL TOWNSEND CLUB SURRENDERS CHARTER

St. Helens Townsend Club number one surrendered its charter to the national organization Wednesday evening during its regular scheduled session in the West St. Helens Community Hall following a refusal to endorse certain candidates for political offices in the coming general election. George Baker, Portland, representing Gordon Ware state manager of the Townsend clubs, is said to have attended the meeting and insisted upon the club endorsing certain candidates. This met with disapproval of members and the charter was surrendered.

According to members, they still favor House Bill 4199 which is the Townsend plan, but refuse to use that name for their organization. An investigation is being conducted of the General Welfare Federation, with headquarters in Washington, D. C. with the idea of affiliating with that organization.

#### COURT SAYS FORMER ST. HELENITE GUILTY MANSLAUGHTER

Earl Lattin, 28, longshoreman residing in Portland, formerly of St. Helens, was found guilty of manslaughter Tuesday by a jury in Circuit court, Portland, in connection with the death of Madison E. Weir, 38, on June 24. Judge Stapleton set 2 p. m. Monday as the time for imposing sentence.  
Lattin was indicted on a second degree murder charge. It was contended by the state, represented by Deputy District Attorneys T. B. Handley and A. M. Hodder that Lattin fatally beat Weir in front of a beer parlor at 815 Southwest Park avenue.  
According to the Oregonian, Lattin testified that he was intoxicated from drinking beer and had no recollection of having struck the elderly man.

#### TICKET SELLING DRIVE NOW ON

A ticket selling campaign was started Thursday noon by a committee headed by Elmer Steele, Bob Nye and Heinie Heumann, in an effort to raise sufficient funds to finance the remaining cost of materials and labor for lighting John Gumm athletic field. This year's school budget committee allows \$600 for the project which was enough to start operations. The remainder will be raised through the sale of tickets to the various events slated for the remainder of this season and next.

#### COURT ACCEPTS FEDERAL GRANT TO HELP FINANCE JAIL PROJECT

At a special meeting Monday, the county court passed a resolution accepting the offer of the United States grant in the sum of \$15,644 for building the new county jail equipment and altering the present county court house.

An order was drawn appointing J. E. Doughty to furnish final plans constructing the proposed new jail and to supervise the construction.

The final plans and specifications will be submitted to W.P.A. officials this weekend for their approval and bids for construction work will be advertised for in the near future.

#### MACCABEES TO BE ORGANIZED

#### LAWRENCE ORWIG KILLED IN WRECK

Funeral services were held Tuesday from the Leslie Memorial church in Salem for Lawrence Orwig, who passed away Saturday night shortly after an auto wreck.

Orwig was passing an oil truck when the accident occurred.

The accident occurred about three Sunday morning as Lawrence and a neighbor boy were returning from skating at Albany. Lawrence lived until shortly after noon the next day but did not regain consciousness. His friend was not injured. Lawrence had just become a licensed aviation pilot.

Lawrence was born in Clatskanie 22 years ago and lived here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Orwig until the family moved to Salem to reside. Lawrence has been working with his father in his meat market.

#### RELIEF COMMITTEE TO CHANGE OFFICE TIME

According to a report from Eva Louisa Tice, administrator of the Columbia County Relief Committee the office time in Clatskanie will undergo a change.

The schedule from now on will

have the local relief office open from 1 p. m. to 2 p. m. on the first Tuesday each month instead of the first Wednesday as heretofore has been the committee's day in Clatskanie.

#### TROUT ARE LIBERATED

The state game commission dumped 75,000 cut-throat trout in the Clatskanie river Saturday and Sunday. About 25,000 were also placed in the Nehalem river near Vernonia. 125,000 were allotted to Clatsop county this year.

### Rainier--

#### COMMERCIAL CLUB DISCUSSES PROBLEMS OF COMMUNITY

A group of 20 business men at the Interstate cafe Monday evening for a regular meeting of the Rainier Commercial club, first dined and then discussed community activities.

Highway improvements in the district were covered by William Reid, who reported that an emergency expenditure by the county in the new drainage district near Clatskanie, where the old road had been covered by construction operation, requiring new surfacing, had taken all loose cash of the county court. Mr. Neil predicted that nothing could be done soon, not earlier, at least, than the passing of a new budget by the county. Further, Mr. Reid, C. R. Hallberg and others conversant with the situation predicted that not even during next year was the prospect too bright. Mr. Reid at a previous meeting

of the commercial club had been appointed to confer with the county court upon the possibility of securing power shovel work in building the highline route here. He told the assembled business men that the reply of the county judge had been that while the equipment belonging to the county was idle, there were no funds available to employ qualified operators.

#### WOMEN'S CLUB HAS BUSINESS SESSION

The Rainier Woman's Club held their regular meeting on Thursday, September 22, at the home of Mrs. E. P. Dove with about thirty members present. During the session delegates were elected to the Third Dist. Convention which will be held at Sandy, Oregon, October 10. Those elected were, Mrs. E. J. Brower and Mrs. R. W. Smith, with Mrs. D. R. Philpott and Mrs. C. R. Hallberg as alternates. Mrs. O. W. White, president of the club will also attend.

#### FORMER RAINIER SCHOOL HEAD DEAD

William C. Gauntt, 56, formerly head of the Rainier schools for nine years, was buried in Portland Saturday.

Mr. Gauntt served as superintendent of the grade and high schools which were combined at that time. In 1925 the Rainier Union high school district was formed and he served as principal of the high school when the schools were separated, and was in charge when the school was built and when the first class graduated from the new school.

The next year he went to Tigard high school as principal. Later he had been engaged in selling school supplies for a Portland firm, where the family resided.
