As to the so called anti-picketing and boycotting measure which will be submitted to the voters on November 8. The Publicity Committee of the Columbia County Central Labor Committee, respectfully asks a little space in your good paper.

Organized labor is opposed to the bill, a right of the workingman. No good can come of it but if the people, being misled through the ballot title, should vote for it, it will lead to strife and dissension.

The industries and labor in Columbia county seem to be getting along very well. We hear of no strikes or disputes. Evidently the employer asks for a day's labor and the employe, under present conditions, gives it. So why, at this time should this anti-labor bill come up, presumably sponsored by the farmers, which is not true for the Oregonian says, "editorially" and much of the bills (expense) to campaign and for financial support comes from business and industry rather than the farmers," and Ray Gill, master of the State Grange, in a printed statement, says that no farmer has been molested while

trucking his own products.

We think, Mr. Editor, that you will be doing an outstanding favor to the people of your community, many of whom work in the mills and logging camps to publish this letter from us. We want no trouble, but we do want that right of every American citizen, to do what we wish to do for our own protection as long as we do not break the laws of the land, and this we will not do.

We are asking that voters read the proposed measure carefully and see if they cannot ascertain the "black man in the woodpile."

That is all we are asking the voters to do and we thank you for this space in your paper.
