### St. Helens--

#### VOTERS LIST INCREASED

With an increase of 474 in the list of registered voters in Columbia county, over the primary election, in general election November 8 is expected to poll the largest vote ever recorded in the county. A total of 10,132 voters registered for the election in Columbia county thus establishing an all-time high mark of this amount 2,308 of which 4,614 were republicans and 4,901 were democrats. For the general election this fall 4,786 republicans, 5,212 democrats, 2 progressive, 2 prohibition, 19 socialists, and 111 miscellaneous, are enrolled. Checking back over records it was found that in 1926, 5,207 voters were registered in the county, in 1934, 8,628 were privileged to cast their ballot and in 1936, 8,756 were recorded, while in 1937, 9,260 signed the card.

#### TWO ARRESTED ON LIVESTOCK LARCENY CHARGE SATURDAY

Alexander A. Currie, Portland, Thomas B. Patterson, and Ray Reynolds of St. Helens were arrested Saturday afternoon by state police for larceny of livestock.

The men were alleged to have butchered one ewe and four lambs owned by H. L. Anderson of Yankton, while on a deer hunting trip. Discovery of the slaughter was made by Mrs. Anderson Friday night when she went to round up the animals for the night. In her search she found where the sheep had been killed and cleaned.

The men appeared Monday before Judge H. K. Zimmerman when they entered pleas of guilty to larceny of livestock. They will be sentenced Saturday.

A \$25 reward offered by the Columbia County Livestock association for furnishing evidence to convict larcenists of livestock will go to H. L. Anderson according to Jarvis Davis, president.

#### WORK STARTED ON SWIMMING POOL--

Actual work began Monday on the St. Helens civic swimming pool which will be located west of the high school building. A crew of seven WPA men started work of digging the top soil and placing it behind the school house for use next spring for landscape purposes.

The \$42,000 pool received an allotment from WPA for \$31,600 the first of June and the balance is to be raised in St. Helens. The committee in charge of the funds will start collections on unpaid pledges this weekend and will endeavor to make new contacts with citizens and firms who have not already been contacted in an effort to raise \$1500 more to complete the \$10,000 pledge.

### Clatskanie--

#### CITY ELECTION IN NOVEMBER

The usual apathy in noticeable in the forthcoming city election. Petitions must be filed with the recorder by Saturday night preceding the election, November fifth.

At the present time no intentions of candidates have been announced. Several city officers are to be elected at the election on November 8.

The term of the mayor, Art Steele, for two years, will expire as do the terms of the city recorder, C. J. Miller and the city treasurer, Charles L. Conyers. These officers are elected for two years.

Councilmen who have served their term of office and whose election expires include Lloyd S. Hattan, Ed L. Larsen and Bert Austin. These vacancies will also be elected for the two year period.

#### FEW SOLDIERS COMING HERE

About 20 regular army soldiers from Vancouver Barracks, Vancouver, Wash., are to be brought to the Marshland camp, three miles from Clatskanie, soon and will be here for about four months doing mapping work.

With rumors current in this locality that all the way from 20 soldiers to the most of Vancouver Barracks were to be moved here, David Povey, camp superintendent at

Marshland, made the above statement yesterday.

Mr. Povey said that camp facilities now would take care of only 80 or 90 additional men as some new WPA men were brought here this week to do some hand work on the dikes.

### Rainier--

#### SCHOOL BUDGET REDUCTION--

The budget of the Rainier Union High school district was formed Monday evening when a committee met with the school board to consider sums required for the operation of the district during the coming year. The committee, with E. E. Rosebrough as chairman and E. F. Fowler as secretary, included also W. A. Wood, C. L. Wilburn and A. J. Unruh, with Fred W. Herman, school clerk, in an advisory capacity.

It is noted by the school board that the sum budgeted for the next year is somewhat lower than during the present year. This came principally from a reduction in the allowance for interest on 1935 refunding bonds. It is thought that the sum of interest, \$717.50, due within the next year will be met nicely by delinquent tax payments.
