MORE TIME GIVEN ELK HUNTERS

TWO DAYS ADDITIONAL SEASON MADE IN EAST OREGON

The northeastern Oregon elk season this fall will extend from Tuesday, November 8, to and including November 20, being two days longer than last year. The open territory has been enlarged by addition of all of Morrow county and the balance of Grant county. The complete list of open counties is as follows: all of Morrow and Grant counties; all of Union and Umatilla counties except the Mt. Emily game refuge; that portion of Wallowa county lying north and west of the Grande Ronde river; and that portion of Baker county lying west of the La Grande-Baker, Baker-Unity and Unity-Vale highways.

Hunters will be required to check in and out of the open area at any one of the following stations: Seneca, Heppner, Milton, Pendleton, Pilot Rock, Ukiah, Dale Ranger Station, Long Creek, Blue Mountain Ranger Station, Sumpter, Baker, North Powder, La Grande, Troy, Unity and John Day.

Each hunter is required to check out of the area after he finishes hunting regardless of whether or not he kills an elk.

The bag limit is one bull elk having horns. Those hunters who purchased elk tags for the Clatsop county elk season and were not successful in bagging an elk, can use the same tag for the eastern Oregon area.

FISH NEED PURE STREAM WATER, SAID

FISH LIFE ENDANGERED BY IMPURITIES, SAID

The necessity for the purification of Oregon streams as a necessity for public health and to preserve commercial and game fish has been repeatedly urged by the State Planning Board in many published reports, it is pointed out by Ormond R. Bean, board chairman.

The board's studies and those made by other agencies especially call attention to the destructive effects of stream pollution on fish life and declare that if the streams of the state are not cleaned up, and cities, towns, and industries required to take care of their wastes Oregon's fish life is seriously endangered.

Waste from pulp plants, canneries, and sawmills are all injurious to fish life and to health. Sewage from cities is a menace that has become acute. Purifying materials have so lowered the oxygen content of certain streams as to render them useless for the support of fish life.

Studies made by the planning board of Oregon's chaotic anti-pollution laws reveal that although the state has about 50 different and conflicting statutes dealing with water pollution, experience has shown their ineffectiveness. Elimination of stream pollution is a three-fold problem: a technical problem, a financial problem, and a legal problem.

To the pollution of streams that formerly gave pleasure to the eye and provided abundant recreational and sporting facilities, the people of Oregon who love their state will never be reconciled. Nor do they feel that the destruction of a great natural resource that has developed as a result of public tolerance is necessary.


