Columbia county's Agriculture Agent, George Nelson, presented the membership with data of the livestock industry and with a series of stereoptical pictures of scenes within the county. He stated that at the

present time there is approximately 3,000 head of cattle in the county which shows a substantial increase during the past few years. This increase means the growth of an industry which remains much the same from year to year as far as market fluctuations. That is the market change is not rapid from high to low within a short space of time so that the stockmen can depend upon a steady living from year to year. It was also explained that the industry provides a means of utilizing cut-over land until it can again be brought into timber productivity.

Other speeches during the afternoon were heard from H. A. Lindgren, secretary of the West Oregon Livestock Association, Kenneth Miller, Agricultural and Livestock Agent of the S. P. & S. Railway Co., J. D. Perry, recently elected state representative of the county and Robert Jones, president of the Clatsop county association and a director in the West Oregon group.

Membership in the Columbia County Association at the close of the meeting had grown to over 62 members which places it at the top of the list for any affiliate of the West Oregon Association. The next meeting of the Columbia group is to be held at Deer Island but the date was not set at that time but will hinge on the date of the West

Oregon meeting to be held February 9 and 10 at Corvallis. Communication will be sent members by the secretary, W. E. Crawford, when the time is set.
