## Autoist's Tax Load Highly Excessive

### Oregon State Motor Association Gives Consideration to Plan

A program designed to lessen the burden of taxation on motorists was considered last week by the Oregon State Motor association board of directors when it met to map plans for the next year, ac-

ording to Dr. E. B. McDaniel, president of the organization.

Pointing out that the average automobile owner pays taxes each year amounting to nearly 25 per cent of the value of his car, the head of organized motordom said the burden had reached a critical point. He predicted an active program to lessen the levies.

Conservatively, he declared, the average automobile is worth \$225. Through levies on new cars, gasoline, oil and accessories, besides his operator's and car license fees and other special expenditures such as mechanical inspection fees and fines, he pays about \$53 each year.

"The average automobile owner earns less than \$30 a week. This means he works for more than 10 days a year exclusively for the automobile tax collector. The motorist can stand no more tax load."
