Mr. and Mrs. Ben Smith spent Sunday with Mr. and Mrs. Bert Tisdale.

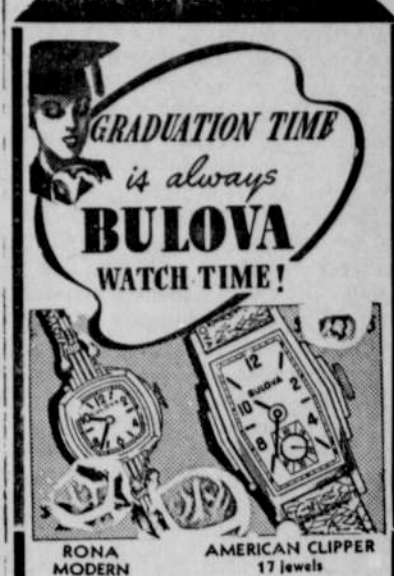
