

Marshal Lolley Issues Warning To Cyclists

Riding on Sidewalks to Be Prohibited; Must Obey Auto Traffic Rules

City Marshal A. D. Lolley was the source of a statement issued Monday warning all bicycle riders in the city of the necessity of obeying all traffic rules regulating automobile drivers and warning cyclists of the violation of riding wheels on city sidewalks.

Complaints have been numerous regarding the use of sidewalks set aside for pedestrian use of the danger to foot travelers.

Each bicycle must be equipped with headlight and tail light or reflector for night use so that motorists may know of the cyclists presence. In order that bicycle riders may acquaint themselves with traffic rules by which they must abide it was stated that the rules are available at the city hall and will be supplied anyone desiring them.

Bicycles will be confiscated by law enforcement officers apprehending anyone violating the law.

Survey Program Of Schools Being Made

F. C. Stellmacher Will Visit Schools of County to Insure Child Safety

F. C. Stellmacher, Deputy State Fire Marshal, is in Columbia County making a survey of fire hazards. He will visit every school in the county as a part of his survey program. The program involves an inspection of each school to insure safety of children from any unnecessary fire hazards. Through the children of the home and the use of a printed survey form, he is asking for a fire hazard inspection of each home with reports back through their school to the State Fire Marshal.

With a survey of Columbia county, a complete survey of the state will have been made by the department. Mr. Stellmacher reports that for the past five years over 68%

of all fires occurred in the homes and that further study discloses that most of these fires could easily have been avoided. America stands one of the heaviest losses per capita of any country from fire losses and it is hoped through an educational program to reduce these losses.

Stellmacher spoke in Vernonia Tuesday of last week to students of the Vernonia high school.

The building was erected by Richard Twineham in 1923 as nearly as the time could be determined. Present title was held by the Intermountain Savings and Loan Association but that company is in

receivership so that permission for the destruction was granted by the Corporation Commission of the State.
