A total of 534 persons received in the safety driving courses recently completed in the eastern Oregon section, it was announced today by Earl Snell, secretary of state, under whose auspices the schools were held. Thirteen schools were held in the area around Baker, Pendleton and La Grande.

high schools, but several classes of adults were organized upon demand of residents of the area, Mr. Snell said. Enrollment in each class ranged from 20 to 50 persons, each of whom furnished his own car for the class.

"These classes in driving are based on the theory that persons who receive scientific training in handling a car will become better drivers, more capable in all varieties of traffic without endangering the property and lives of themselves or others," Snell declared.

Anyone 15 years of age or older may enroll in these classes, it was said. Beginners and those who wish to improve their technique are taken through a complete course in care of the car, starting and stopping, maneuvering in traffic, parallel parking, starting and stopping on hills and the proper method of making turns. Instruction on the rules and regulations pertaining to motor vehicles is stressed and the instructors concentrate on producing the proper "driver attitude".

"By 'driver attitude' we mean that concept of motoring which takes into account the rights of others," Snell declared.

ers, the safety of car passengers and pedestrians and the faculty of handling the car in such a manner as to meet all emergencies with a margin of safety," Snell explained. In other words, the course seeks to produce drivers who will always be "safe drivers," he said.

Classes in the eastern Oregon area were conducted at Elgin High School, Baker, Ponderosa, Vale, John Terprise, Nyssa, Ontario, Vale, John Day, Burns, MacLaughlin, LaGrande, and Pendleton High School.

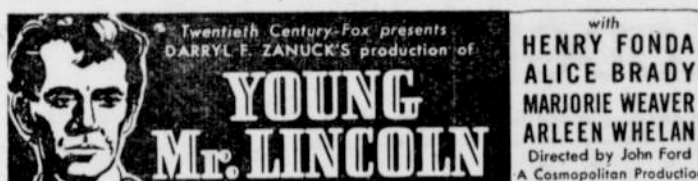
