SEASON TO OPEN ON BULL ELK

SEPTEMBER 3 TO 9 INCLUSIVE ARE TO BE OPEN DATES

Owing to the fact that our synopsis has not been issued as we have not yet been advised of the migratory bird seasons by the Federal Government, we wish to call to the attention of the sportsmen of the

state the fact that there will be a grouse season in Union, Baker and Willowa counties, which will run from August 20 to September 5, both dates inclusive.

The bag limit for such birds will be four birds a day or eight of these birds in any seven consecutive days, or not more than eight birds in possession at any one time. The balance of the state is entirely closed to grouse.

There will also be an elk season in Clatsop county for full elk only, from the third day of September to the ninth day of September, both dates inclusive.

The purchaser of a bull elk tag for use in Clatsop county may use the same tag during the Eastern Oregon elk season providing no bull elk was killed in Clatsop county.

Our game synopsis will be out in sufficient time to give proper notice of other seasons.

The deer season will start as usual on September 20 and will end on October 25th.
