## The Forum

A LETTER FROM WILLIAM BORTHWICK TO DR. TOWNSEND

Mr. Wm. Borthwick, Tax Commissioner of Hawaii in a letter to Dr. Townsend said, "Allow me to congratulate you and your organization on the signal victory which you won in bringing the plan to a vote in congress. For a victory it was. Four years ago for one to have declared congress would allow a vote on such a 'crack pot' idea would have been a reflection on his intelligence. How times have changed, but with all the change we still have the economic conditions of poverty, fear and despair.

"Rest assured, my friend, it was not because the plan would not work that it was voted down, but because those behind the scenes who were pulling the puppet strings knew it would work. They knew it would rob them of their power to control the flow of money to the hands of the people, which power they now have, and have used to produce the deplorable condition in which we find ourselves, a condition which in many ways is worse than chattel slavery, because the chattel slave was in most cases well fed, well clothed and well sheltered. The chattel slave was worth money. Which is more than can be said of a large portion of our people, who are worth nothing to their masters and less to themselves.

Our economic masters will ridicule and defeat any plan that would help us get out of debt, or in any way deprive them of the control of money. Our debt, national, state, city and county, is 75 billions, while private debts at the very least total is 175 billion dollars. If all the real money we have was applied to the payment of our debt, we could pay about three and one-half per cent of what we owe. Should the Townsend Plan be adopted, it would force into circulation at least ten billion dollars a year, which, with only the average turnover of fifteen times, would mean one hundred and fifty billion dollars. Once the plan is in operation the power to control one hundred and fifty billion will be taken from our money masters, and be in the hands of the people."

This is the real reason why congress will not permit the plan to go into effect. However, the majority of congressmen do not know this. They, like the majority of our people, are ignorant of the means which our money creators control our circulating medium. Through the manipulation of bonds and National and Federal reserve notes, which enables them to limit or expand the money we use at will and by that means control the price of every thing we need or produce. Until this power is wrested from them, the United States and perhaps the whole civilized world will remain as it is with half of the people struggling for a mere existence. The gold standard myth has been exploded, that is, our money, to be good, must be redeemable in gold. Nothing is now redeemable in gold or backed by gold. Lincoln's greenbacks saved America more than eleven billion dollars in interest.

"Dr. John Robinson in his book 'Proofs of Conspiracy Against All Governments and Religions,' written in 1797, gives us the origin of the word 'Economist.' But their daring project was to destroy Chris-

tianity and bring about the total change of government. Economists are for hire and will undertake to prove anything. They are paid to prove or disprove anything, even things they once proved. Political liberty is a fine thing and much to be desired but with economic freedom it will be like dead sea apples. There are many politicians in our congress, but few statesmen with courage to do the thing they should do. We need an intelligent and determined congress that will carry out its Constitutional mandate to coin our money and fix the value thereof. Had this been done we would not now be suffering the condition we are in and in which we will remain until it is done.
