

Loggers Invited to Participate in Opener September 22

Vernonia Team Participates as Guest Eleven in Tualatin League

An invitation directed to the Vernonia Loggers football eleven was received this week asking the team to participate in the Washington county opener Friday evening, September 22 at 8 p. m.

The situation as was explained is that the Washington County Tualatin League embraces seven teams which leaves one without competition for the opening and necessitates the invitation of an outside team.

The league is divided for the opening with four teams in one division competing with four teams in the other division. Competition is arranged so that one continuous game is played with two teams, one from each division, playing one 15-minute quarter of the game.

The divisions have been designated east and west, the west side teams comprising Hillsboro, Forest Grove, St. Marys and Vernonia and the east side Newberg, Tigard, Beaverton and Sherwood.

The game is to be played on the Pacific University field at Forest Grove.

SALE OF 500 PERMITS ORDERED

ABOUT 100 SOLD TO DATE; GREATER CALL EXPECTED SOON

The state game commission at its meeting in July ordered the sale of 500 special permits to take antlerless deer during the regular open season for buck deer, September 20 to October 25, in the area immediately adjacent to the Mule Deer game reserve in Klamath and Lake counties. Approximately 100 tags have been sold so far and the demand for tags is expected to increase as the season approaches. Anyone desiring a tag can secure one by forwarding to the office of the game commission in Portland the fee of five dollars together with information as to the number and kind of hunting license owned. The commission is compelled, according to law, to issue tags in the order that the applications are received and after 500 tags have been sold, no more will be issued.

A complete description and map of the area open to antlerless deer hunting can be found in the official synopsis of the 1939 hunting regulations, copies of which are now available at leading sporting goods and hardware stores.

Hunters carrying antlerless deer permits for this area will be required to check in and out of any one of the following stations: Lakeview, Paisley and Dairy.

City Council Ordinance to Regulate Placing of Poles

An ordinance recently passed by the Vernonia city council is given below to reveal regulations now in effect in the city governing the placing of poles, posts and similar erections and the placing of drop wires, guys, stay rods and projections from poles and buildings upon the streets, alleys and highways of the city.

Section 1. All telephone, telegraph, electric light wires and wires of every description for conveying electric current in any form hereinafter installed and running from any building or structure within the fire limits of the City of Vernonia to any pole, line or fixture standing, upon or above any street, alley or public place of said City of Vernonia, shall be at least 18 feet above the established street grade or the level of the side walk at their lowest point, except where said building is of less height than 18 feet, and wires running to such building shall at their lowest point be at least as high above the established grade of the adjacent street and the level of the adjacent sidewalk as is the highest point of said building, and all such drop wires shall be run as nearly as practicable at right angles to the face of the building which they enter.

Section 2. No guy wires or guy rods shall hereafter be placed upon any pole or line within the city limits except at dead ends or sharp angles in said lines and shall not be anchored at a greater distance than thirty feet from the base of the pole so guyed or stayed, and all such rods, guys and stays either heretofore or hereafter installed shall be installed in wooden boxing at least four inches and not more than five inches square from the

to replace, and shall be installed in such a manner as not to leave any space between said pole and the sidewalk surface adjacent thereto.

Section 7. All steps on poles hereinafter installed shall be placed so as to extend out from said pole in a line parallel with the curb line and the lowermost step shall be at least seven feet from the level of the sidewalk or curbing.

Section 8. All poles hereafter erected within the city of Vernonia shall be placed next to and inside the curbline of the street and shall be placed at such points as not to interfere with the free and unobstructed use of said streets and thoroughfares.

Section 9. No telegraph, telephone or electric light pole or other erection of any character shall be installed upon any street, highway or thoroughfare in said city nearer than three feet from any fire hydrant.

Section 10. Any person, company or corporation installing or maintaining any wire, rod, stay, guy, pole, post, step, sign or other structure or appliance in violation of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed fifty dollars, and each day such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

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
