



After several hours of consideration of proposals and counter propositions the committee from Local 37 presented a proposal that the members of Local 2557 pay to Local 37 I. W. A. the sum of 50c per month per member for a permit to work at the Oregon-American Lumber Corporation mill.

This proposal was made out in form as a memorandum of agreement and as an integral part of same it was stated that this agreement was to become effective if and when it shall be ratified by Local 2557 and Local 37.

It might be of interest to the public to know that Mr. Chappell stated he was aware that such an agreement could not be made a matter of record and placed in the minutes of Local 2557 as if such action was taken the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners would take away the charter under which Local 2557 existed. The record could show instead of an appropriation of any sum to Local 37 a disbursement of such amount could be made for subscriptions to the Ladies Home Journal and check issued to Local 37. What action the publishers of the Ladies Home Journal might take was not mentloned.

As we are not in the magazine racket such a proposition might be said to have had a very offensive odor.

We wish to state that had such an agreement been ratified by our Local we would not now be a Local as our charter would have been revoked and the mill would have been placed on the unfair list.

Such action by the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners would result in a loss of orders to an extent which would make it impossible to operate the plant at anywhere near its present production.

We wish to say also that legal demand has been made on Local No. 37 I. W. A. for the return of all money and property which belonged to Local 2557 at the time Local 37 installed its charter and illegally retained such money and property.

In the event such demand is not complied with proper relief will be asked from the courts.
