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## Comparison of School District Finances Given in New Report

### Levy in Mills Increases for City Budget, 1940 Tax Below 1939

In a report issued by county officials this week a comparison of finances of the school districts in the county and of the population centers was revealed. The information given below, although not complete, gives a comparison of the local standing with other parts of the county and shows a comparison between 1939 and 1940.

Selecting school district No. 47, Jt. Vernonia, the tax in 1939 was \$15,305.81 while for 1940 it is \$26,397.96. St. Helens was 1939, \$4,858.88; 1940, \$46,961.21; Clatskanie, 1939, \$25, 798.19; 1940, \$24,478.11; Rainier, 1939, \$13, 986.35; 1940, \$14,407.65.

Union high school district No. 1 was taxed \$32,958.72 in 1939 and \$30,128.17 in 1940.

## Post Office To Be Open Saturdays

## Seals Prove Factor in Reduction

Redoubled efforts to control tuberculosis were urged today by Miss Elsie Witchen, acting executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association.

Miss Witchen said that Christmas seals, which are now on sale under auspices of the tuberculosis association, had been a powerful factor in reducing tuberculosis deaths in the last 32 years, but that war and international tension now threatens this reduction.

"In periods of great strain, such as the World War of 1914-18," Miss Witchen said, "all countries recorded a definite increase of deaths from tuberculosis. The anxiety, restlessness, and privation of these years were causes of the higher death toll."

"Miss Witchen said that the tuberculosis association planned in 1940 to press its campaign against the white plague more vigorously than ever before. The year-round program is financed entirely by the sale of Christmas seals.

## Body of Man Found Near Camp

### Carl Anderson Found Near Home at O-A Camp Following Search

The body of Carl A. Anderson, 49 year old logger of the Oregon-American Lumber Corporation, was discovered Monday lying in the woods not far from his house near Camp McGregor. Anderson had been missing since Friday afternoon. When discovered by fellow workmen, who had been searching since his disappearance, Anderson's left hand had been torn and his right temple and cheek mutilated badly. Upon medical examination before the body was moved, it was concluded that Anderson had been the victim of a heart attack, and that wild animals had caused the mutilation.

High herds, including dry cows: High herds, over 20 cows: 1. C. W. Sherman, Scappoose. 2. M. M. Lyons, Sauvie Island; High herds 12 to 20 cows: 1. W. R. Wolff, Vernonia. 2. C. L. Biggs, Vernonia; High herds under 12 cows: 1. C. E. Gregory, Goble. 2. Theo. Flink, Rainier.

Seven cows were culled or removed from the herds because of the following reasons: 4, Bang's disease reactors; 1, sterility; 2, garget.

## Information Given Following Hearing Held Saturday Afternoon

Members of the Hydroelectric Commission of Oregon were in Vernonia last Saturday afternoon to hold a hearing relative to the filing of preliminary petitions for the formation of a peoples' utility district in the Nehalem valley.

A fairly large crowd was present for the afternoon to listen and give opinions both pro and con regarding the proposal. The petitions had been filed some time ago and the date of the hearing set after that time. Lester Sheeley, acting as chairman of the proposing group, spoke in favor of the district as did several others. Also during the meeting some sentiment against the proposition was heard. Several petitions were filed requesting the removal of property from the district. A petition was filed by a group from the Mist and Birkenfeld district, the Oregon American Lumber Corporation requested its property removed as did Clark and Wilson.

The report of the Hydroelectric Commission following its preliminary investigation of the district was given Mr. Sreeley and is given below for the information it contains: INTRODUCTION

Voters preliminary petitions requesting the Hydroelectric Commission of Oregon to make a preliminary investigation of the advisability of creating a peoples' utility district in Columbia and Washington counties were filed in the office of the Hydroelectric Commission on October 18, 1939. Section 56-3405, Oregon Code 1935 Supplement, being a part of the Peoples' Utility District Law, requires the Hydroelectric Commission to conduct a public hearing on said petitions not less than 30 days nor more than 60 days after the date of filing and also to present at this time a report of the Commission's preliminary investigation of the proposed district.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED DISTRICT

This proposed district is located along the Nehalem River in Columbia and Washington counties. It has a total area of 83 square miles of which 68 are in Columbia county and 15 in Washington county. The area in Columbia county is about 10 per cent of the county total and the area in Washington county about 2 per cent of the area of that county.

The district would extend from the Clatsop-Columbia county line, just west of Birkenfeld, easterly and southerly up the Nehalem River to include Timber and West Timber in Washington county. The unincorporated communities known as Mist, Birkenfeld and Pittsburg, and the incorporated city of Vernonia in Columbia county are included. A map showing the boundaries of the proposed district is included at the back of this report.

POPULATION

Most of the people, living in the Nehalem Basin, live within the boundaries of the proposed district. Summarizing the population of voting precincts in this area, as contained in the 1930 census, gives a population of 5,282 for that part of the district in Columbia county. The Timber precinct in Washington county had a population of 624 in 1930 which added to the Columbia county total would make a total for the district of 4,906. Vernonia, the only incorporated city, had a population of 1,625 in 1930. It is interesting to note that the population of Vernonia was only 142 in 1920 and it is apparent that most of its growth took place between 1920 and 1930. It is difficult to estimate what may have occurred by way of growth or decline in population since 1930.

The State Planning Board estimated the growth of population in Columbia county as a whole as 7.3 per cent between 1930 and 1937. If we apply this same percentage (Continued on page 8.)
