When Judge Wilkerson was the principal of Vernonia High School, he presented to the winners loving cups to remain in the honored one's keeping. The custom died after the Judge's taking his present office; then two years ago the plan was revived but

changed so that the cup stays in the school's possession after the last winner has had his name engraved thereon.

Referee Decision Submitted

Log Haulers Classified as Individual Contractors in Most Cases

Log haulers are individual contractors in most cases but bakery driver-salesmen are employees under jurisdiction of the unemployment insurance law.

Referees Lawrence Brown and William H. Witt made this distinction in decisions submitted to the State Unemployment Compensation Commission.

A Portland bakery driver who worked from April 15 to July 29, 1938, was awarded benefits of \$88.51, payable \$13 a week, last May. When the firm set out that the driver's pay was his profit after expenses had been deducted, the claimant declared that he devoted his whole time to the job and was forced to abide strictly by many rules and regulations.

The log hauler, however, used a truck and trailer in moving logs for several outfits, carried insurance protection on his own equipment and was not controlled by

those who employed him, the referee pointed out.

In both cases original determinations of the claim deputies were upheld by the referees.

Employment Program Ranked 16th

Oregon's Position Given at 26th in Jobless Benefits in November

Although seasonal letdowns were apparent in many lines, Oregon's re-employment program in November ranked 16th in the United States. In population the state is 34th.

With 5,343 job placements Oregon topped Washington's 4,052 and many other states of greater population, such as Massachusetts, Kansas, Virginia, Florida, Oklahoma and Colorado. With more than 80 per cent of the jobs in private industry, Oregon also was among the leaders, according to reports reaching Silas Gaiser, Administrator for the State Unemployment Compensation Commission.

In jobless benefits this state's position was 26th. Washington's \$442,542 compensation was more than double Oregon's \$206,540. About half of the nation's \$28,347,000 in jobless checks for November were from New York, California, Illinois and Pennsylvania.

Oregon's active file of unemployed amounting to 35,827 stood 37th among the states. Washington's 102,870 was nearly three times as much on December 1, 1939, while California reported 460,878 out of work. Even New Mexico with less than half Oregon's population had more unemployed.
