Sixty-five percent of the tourists visiting Oregon during the year 1939 came from Washington and California figures compiled by Earl Snell, secretary of state, revealed today. Of the total of 149,502 visiting cars registered in the state during the year 69,958 were from California and 28,430 were from Washington.

Non-resident registration for the year topped that of 1938 by 10,529 cars, or an increase of 7.58 percent, Snell's figures showed. The year's total was the highest for any year except 1937 when heavy migrations from the mid-west dust bowl swelled Oregon's tourist figures to 155,161 visiting cars.

Next to the two neighboring states on the Pacific coast, the north central states sent the most cars to Oregon, accounting for 13.61 percent of the total. The mountain states accounted for 10.49 percent, 2.55 percent came from the north Atlantic states, 2.53 percent from the south central states and 1.03 percent from the south Atlantic states. Foreign cars and those registered from Alaska and the District of Columbia, amounted to 3.98 percent.

July was the heaviest month for tourists in 1939, with 31,721 non-resident cars registered that month. The three vacation months of June, July and August saw 83,844 cars registered, 56 percent of the year's total.

The city of Ashland led registration stations in the state with 27,017 cars, 12 percent of the total. Cave City was second with 20,917, Brookings was third with 12,559, Grants Pass fourth with 8,574, Umatilla fifth with 6,935, Medford sixth with 6,190, Klamath Falls seventh with 6,070, Arlington eighth with 5,725, Portland ninth with 5,444, Bend tenth with 5,033.
