FACTS FOR DRIVERS

Oregon reduced its traffic death rate from 12.7 persons killed per 100,000,000 miles traveled in 1938 to 11.8 for 1939, Earl Snell, secretary of state, revealed today.

The reduction in the death rate was made possible by virtue of the fact that in the face of a 6.68 per cent increase in the vehicular mileage reported in the state for the year, the actual number of traffic fatalities was lower than that for 1938.

"The death rate is the true barometer of the trend of traffic accidents in the state because this figure indicates the number of persons killed in relation to the amount of 'exposure' during the year," Snell said. "Oregon motorists are to be congratulated on their showing and everyone who uses the highways and streets during 1940 should take encouragement from this achievement and make a still better showing for this year."

A total of 241,169,975 gallons of gasoline was consumed in Oregon during the year 1939, compared to 225,964,359 gallons in 1938, or an increase of 15,205,615 gallons. The consumption in 1939 was 6.72 per cent over that for the year preceding. The December consumption totaled 17,776,929 or an increase of 963,984 gallons or five per cent over the December consumption in 1938.

Expressed in mileage, motor vehicles traveled a total of 2,758,984,514 miles in Oregon during the year 1939, an increase of 6.68 per

cent over the mileage for 1938. Total taxes paid on gasoline consumed in 1939 was \$12,058,499, an increase of \$760,280.98 over the tax collected in 1938.
