Check Being Made of Results of Planting Last Year

In line with the game commission's program for the scientific that will be raised at its four game farms during 1940, surveys of the available pheasant area are already under way. Planting sites will be chosen in advance of liberation. the selection being based upon suitable food, cover and water conditions, the existing bird population and stress of hunting. In conjunction with this, a check is also being made insofar as possible of the results of plantings made the past season.

This program, initiated last year n the western part of Oregon under the direction of John Mc-Kean, has been extended to east ern Oregon where it will be handled by Don Moore. Both men are graduates of the fish and game management course at the state college and have had, in addition, practical experience in bird liberation work. Sportsmen, realizing the advantages of releasing birds on a scientific basis, have man tested a keen interest and spirit of cooper-


