These unsafe actions included riding two or more abreast, riding double on one bicycle, cutting across the path of traffic suddenly, failing to observe traffic signals or signs, hitching rides on moving vehicles and riding on the wrong side of the street.

"Every person who rides a bicycle should remember that in the eyes of Oregon law, bicycles are regarded as vehicles and as such are subject to the same traffic regulations as other vehicles," Snell declared. "This means that bicycle riders must stop at top signs, observe traffic and right-of-way laws that apply to traffic control."

"Young bicycle riders frequently forget to give proper arm signals when making turns and they often ride several abreast, thus causing the riders to be out in the path of the faster moving automobile traffic. These practices must be eliminated if we are to reduce the some imprudent action at the time bicycle death toll."
