

### Widows, To Get Insurance Payments

Family Group Claims to Be Filed in Portland Security Office

The widow and children of any worker in Columbia county whose death occurred after last Decem-

ber 31 are entitled to monthly insurance payments from the federal government of the deceased father had had sufficient employment at jobs covered by the federal social security act with minimum earnings required by the law.

These payments are made regardless of the age at which the father's death occurred, according to James E. Peebles, Portland manager of the social security board, located in the Old Post Office Building.

Some claims have been filed with his office, Peebles said, but

other families in this county may now be eligible. The Portland office accepts claims for these payments from Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Hood River, Multnomah, Tillamook, Wasco, Washington and Yamhill counties.

The following requirements must be met to qualify for these monthly benefits: (1) the worker must have died after December 31; (2) the widow must have in her care a child or adopted child of the worker that is less than age 16 or under 18 if in school and (3) the worker must have been employed at jobs covered by the social security act in at least six calendar quarters since January 1, 1937 with earnings of at least \$50 in each of those quarters from such employment.

These federal insurance payments, Peebles explained, should not be confused with the state law in behalf of needy dependent children. Federal payments are made as a matter of right, and not based upon need, and can be paid only if the deceased worker's employment record shows that he has met the requirements of the social security act.

Workers in jobs covered by the federal law have a social security account card. They contribute one per cent of their wages or salaries and the employer pays an equal amount.

### Dairy Herd Association Report Given

25 Herds Comprising 502 Cows Examined for Improvement

Number of herds on test, 25; number of cows enrolled, 502, of which 114 are dry. Total production: milk, 254,548; fat, 11,258.7. Number of 40-lb. cows, 82. Average production (including cows in milk and cows dry) milk, 507 lbs.; fat, 22.43.

High herds including dry cows: High herds over 20 cows: (1) W. R. Wolfe, Vernonia, 23 grade Guernseys averaging 642 pounds of milk and 28.4 pounds of fat.

High herds 12-20 cows: M. M. Lyons, Sauvie Island, 18 registered Jerseys, averaging 688 pounds of milk and 36.2 pounds of fat.

High herds under 12 cows: C. E. Gregory, Goble, 5 registered Guernseys, averaging 803 pounds of milk and 36.5 pounds of fat.

A total of eight cows were culled or removed from the herds for the following reasons: Bang's disease reactors, 3; old age, 2; accident, 1; and low production, 2.

Arrangements have been worked out by the directors of the Columbia Cow Testing Association to assist the members in selling surplus calves from their dairy herds from high producing cows so as to find a market for the calves and at the same time better assure their quality to prospective buyers.

The arrangements in selling these calves are as follows:

(1) All heifer calves must be from purebred sires and from good grade cows that produce at least 300 pounds of butterfat or more per year.

(2) All calves must be at least three days old before being shipped.

(3) Prices of the calves are as follows: at the farm, \$10; in crates, F. O. B. shipping point in county, \$12.

(4) The member must furnish a statement signed by himself and attested by the cow tester stating that each calf sold meets the above specifications.

According to these rules, there is going to be between now and June a considerable number of calves for sale at the above prices which were adopted by the Columbia County Cow Testing Association at its last annual meeting.
