Fifteen Oregon counties scored reductions in the number of traffic deaths recorded during the year 1939 as compared to the toll for 1938, it was revealed today in a bulletin from the office of Earl Snell, secretary of state. The reductions ranged from five percent in Lane county to 100 percent in Sherman and Gilliam counties.

The following are the counties and their percentages of improvement in traffic fatalities: Sherman, 100 percent; Gilliam, 100 percent; Wasco, 78 percent; Baker 50 percent; Josephine, 50 percent; Umatilla, 36 percent; Grant, 33 percent; Union, 25 percent; Tillamook, 25 percent; Clatsop, 20 percent; Curry, 20 percent; Columbia, 14 percent; Marion, 13 percent; Coos, 11 percent; Lane, 5 percent. Three counties, Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler reported no traffic deaths for the year 1939, Snell's

figures revealed. Grant, Harney, Jefferson, each reported but one death for the year while two counties, Crook and Josephine, had but two each.
