

## Summary of Association Work Made

### Biggs, Johnson to Continue as Directors for Coming Year

At the annual meeting of the Columbia County Cow Testing Association at Clatskanie last week, a summary of the association's work has made substantial progress in for the past year indicated that it increasing the membership and interest in cow testing work. Frode Lassen, cow tester, reported that he has been spending 17 days testing 26 herds in Columbia county each month. There are reports that other dairymen are desirous of joining the Association in order to get the benefits from the testing work.

The principal talk was made to a group of 25 dairymen by Mr. H. P. Ewalt, Instructor in Dairy Husbandry at O. S. C. Mr. Ewalt is in charge of the dairy herd at the Oregon State College. He gave a very interesting talk on the winter feeding of dairy cattle for the most economical production. He recommended that dairymen mix their own feeds to obtain the most economical results. He also stated that it is quite important that dairy cows get all the water they need to drink during the winter months when they are being stabled.

The former directors of the Association were reelected again for the coming year; namely, Fred Boesel, Warren; Fred Spaeth, Goble; R. L. Keatley, Clatskanie; W. C. Johnson, Mist; and C. L. Piggs, Vernonia. Mr. Fred Boesel is president of the Association and presided over the meeting.

Arrangements have been made by the Association for selling calves from high producing cows of the members of the Association.
