#### "BRITISH INTELLIGENCE" AT JOY SHOWS WAR SPY WORK

Espionage and intrigue, elements of great current interest, are the basis of Warner Bros.' timely film, "British Intelligence," which is coming to the Joy Theatre on Saturday.

To keep the film authentic, the studio research department burned the midnight oil these many weeks for material on World War espionage and counter-espionage.

Margaret Lindsay plays the role of a girl posing as a German spy working for the British government and a British spy working for the German government all at the same time. Boris Karloff portrays the ace German spy who has been causing many an Englishman gray hair. The action represented by the two coming together is an accurate account, while entirely fictional, of events which might be transpiring abroad at the very moment.
