Division of Land Use Between Forestry, Livestock Discussed

The Western Oregon Livestock ssociation turned its annual convention at Oregon State college into a work session which resulted in the adoption of a series of committee reports which constitute the working program of the association or the coming year. This unusual convention was completely devoid of set speeches, although it was conducted in such manner by President Albert Powers of Coquille discussion on the various committee

It was also praised for its work toward a management plan for big game to prevent overstocking of wild life in certain areas.

A summary of the two-day program is given below: The first day, Wednesday, was occupied by committee meetings. The Thursday session began at 10 o'clock with a general assembly with President Albert Powers presiding; address of welcome was delivered by OSC President George Peavy and response by A. C.
