No Major Change in 1940 Season Playing Rules Drafted

Regulations to Be Almost Same as Those of Last Year

The playing rules to be used for 1940 by the Oregon State Softball Association will be virtually the same as those used in 1939.

The changes in the 1940 rules as adopted by the Official Joint Rules Committee of Softball were made in an endeavor to put more scoring into the game, and to decrease the effectiveness of the outstanding pitchers throughout the country. The Executive Committee of the State Association feels that a large majority of the pitchers and teams in Oregon have not developed to the place where we can accept the national rules in their entirety.

For the 1940 season, Oregon will use the National Amateur Softball Rules with the following exceptions:

1. Nine men shall constitute a team.
2. The pitching distance shall be 40 feet, measured from the outside corner of the home plate to the front line of the pitcher's plate. (This overrules Rule 3, Section 4).
3. The batsman is out immediately after three strikes have been called. (This overrules Rule 20, section 7 which allows the batter to attempt to reach first base on the third strike not caught).
4. A runner on third base cannot score on a wild pitch or a passed ball. (This section is an addition to Rule 30, and was eliminated from the national rules in 1939). A runner on third base when a pitch is started cannot score on any pitched ball which passes the batter, provided the catcher returns the ball directly to the pitcher, except when the bases are full and the runner is forced to advance by reason of the batsman being awarded a base on balls, or if an illegal pitch, or balk, is declared.

A runner on third when the pitch started may score on a fair hit ball or on a play on himself or on any other runner. (Any attempt to make a play on a runner who is trying to score, or who is returning to third base after a pitched ball, released that runner from the necessity of returning to third base and permits him to score if he can make it).

A runner on third base when the pitch started may score on a pitched ball which passes the bat-

Andy Killian and Roy Bell have both won titles in the state meet at Oregon City. Killian won his title last year and Bell captured his at the tournament in March.

The referee for the evening will be State Patrolman Raleigh Wheeler, the local representative of the State Police force.

Each bout will have plenty of action if the ball is then thrown to any fielder other than the pitcher.

It should be noted that the above exceptions to the national rules tend to increase the effectiveness of the pitcher.

The more important changes in the national rules for this year which have not been included in the above list of exceptions are as follows:

1. Rule 3, Sec. 6—Add "No top lacing, webbing or other device between the thumb and body of a glove or mitt worn by a first baseman or other fielder shall be more than four inches in length."

2. Rule 3, Sec. 8—"All parts of the uniform, except shoes, cap and stockings, worn by the pitcher shall be of the same dark color with no lettering or trimming on the front of the uniform."

3. Rule 8, Sec. 1—"Preliminary to pitching, the pitcher shall come to a full stop facing the batsman with both feet squarely on the ground in contact with the pitcher's plate for not less than one second before taking one hand off the ball at the start of the wind-up or back swing. (Note: One second of time may be determined by repeating at ordinary conversational speed the words 'one thousand and one')."

4. Rule 8, Sec. B—No Pitch—"No pitch shall be declared whenever the pitcher attempts a quick return of the ball before the batsman has taken position or is off balance as the result of a previous pitch." This rule will eliminate the quick pitch, which has caused considerable trouble in the past.

It should be particularly noted that Rule 3, Sec. 1 provides that the bat shall have a safety grip of cork, tape or composition material. This is an important regulation and shall be strictly adhered to for the safety of players and spectators alike.

Commission Asks Help Of Fishermen

Scientific Liberation Department Set Up to Conduct Surveys

Cooperation of fishermen of Oregon in reporting catches of fish from various streams and lakes, to assist in the scientific liberation of fish, is sought by the Oregon State Game Commission.

At a recent meeting of the Game Commission, a new department, known as the scientific liberation department, was set up. In addition to liberations this department will conduct surveys on lakes and streams.

The work of this department cannot be completed unless reports are obtained of the catches in the various streams and lakes. To make it easy for the sportsmen to assist a "catch card" has been prepared and will be distributed to all sportsmen's organizations, fishing tackle dealers and all resorts that cater to sportsmen.

The cards are post paid so no expense is involved to the fisherman, who after his day's outing can fill out the card and drop it into a mail box or postoffice.

Officials of the Game Commission are hopeful that a large percentage of the fishermen will give their cooperation and make constant use of the "catch cards" so that catches of various species of fish from the various waters of Oregon may be recorded.
