

### Forest Service Starts Spring Tree Planting

Four-Fifths Will Be Placed in Douglas Fir Region

The United States forest service will plant more than two million trees in Oregon and Washington this spring, according to Assistant Regional Forester O. F. Ericson. Four-fifths of these will be planted in the Douglas fir region and the remainder east of the mountains in the ponderosa pine country. The trees are two and three year-old stock from the forest service nursery at Wind River, Washington. The trees are planted seven or eight feet apart and about 700 to the acre. That comes to about 3,500 acres. Planting is done by the CCC. The areas planted are old burns and logged-off areas that now are not restocking and that show no evidence of restocking within a reasonable time. In some areas precautions are taken to keep rabbits and other rodents from killing the young trees. Losses from drought, fire, and other causes usually take 20 to 25 per cent of the stock that is planted. Planting costs about 1.5 cents per tree. The forest service

has planted about 22,000 acres in Oregon and 38,000 acres in Washington, Ericson states.
