Gasoline consumption totaled 15,810,960 gallons in Oregon last month figures compiled by Earl Snell, secretary of state, revealed today. This is an increase of 1,750,945 gallons, or 12.4 percent over the consumption for February, 1939. The increase gallonage would be sufficient gasoline to take a car around the world 100 times, provided there was a super highway built along the equator, Snell remarked.

For the year to date, Oregon users have purchased 31,903,436 gallons, an increase of 2,888,811 gallons over the total of 28,914,625 gallons for January and February of 1939. Total tax paid on the gasoline so far this year was \$1,590,171.83 compared to \$1,445,731.26 for the corresponding period last year, an increase of \$144,440.57.
