## Relay Team Sets State Record Fri.

### 46.8 Seconds Time for Class C 440 Relay at Eugene

The Vernonia high school sprint relay team, participating in the Hayward relays in Eugene last Friday afternoon, established a state record in the 440-yard relay for class C schools, covering the distance in 46.8 seconds.

The same boys ran later in the afternoon in the sprint medley relay, placing third behind Coquille and Springfield.

The boys who accompanied Coach McCoy to Eugene were: Claire Sunnell, Harry Lesby, Cloice Hall and Phillip Millis. This was the first return of Coach McCoy to the scene of his college triumphs under Colonel Bill Hayward whose name this meet carries.

(Continued from page 1) averages over \$100,000 a year in addition, the citizens are beginning to realize that they can't possibly expect permanent rate reductions—if any at all—when net earnings of the system for the last ten years have averaged only \$329,890.00 a year and actual gross income is less today than it was ten years ago.

Now with one of the biggest industries moving out of the district skeptical citizens are beginning to wonder how the PUD estimates of \$114,000 increase in revenues this year can come true, particularly when the district is losing a huge payroll represented by 450 steadily employed men and their families and losses to other businesses that these people helped support.
