(Continued from page 1) that citizens would have little hope of procuring the promised rate reductions, even if the district borrowed just sufficient money to buy lines and facilities. In other PUD districts the practice has been to borrow far more cash than required to buy private lines and if the PUD commissions see fit to do so, the public is utterly helpless to prevent the plunge into deep debt political management and control of huge sums which electric light users and property owners must ultimately repay.
