## St. Helens Host For District

St. Helens has been named host city for the 1940 district softball tournament to be held August 17 and 18. The tournament was held in Vernonia last year and Astoria the year before. The 1940 tournament at St. Helens will be the second district affair held at that place.

Winner of the tourney will go to the state play off at Salem.

## Problem Study Being Made

A thorough study of fresh water game fish problems in Oregon is being conducted by Dr. H. S. Davis of Washington, D. C., who is in charge of Aquicultural Investigations for the U. S. Fish and Wild Life Service.

Dr. Davis, one of the world's most noted fish biologists and pathologists, is being assisted by Dr. P. R. Needham of Stanford University, who is in charge of similar work on the Pacific Coast.

The present study, according to Dr. Davis, will include fish hatcheries, artificial cultivation of fish, fish management and planting of fish, together with stream surveys. It is probable that Dr. Davis will be in Oregon for two or three weeks, after which he will go to the State of Washington for a 10-day period.

Upon the conclusion of his Oregon investigation, including visits and studies of all hatcheries operated by the Oregon State Game Commission, Dr. Davis will advise the commission as to any changes

or improvements he deems necessary in the interest of improved fish culture.

Dr. Davis announced that a biological station has been established at the old Clackamas fish hatchery with Reed Nielson, biologist, in charge for work in this region. The work of this station will be carried on in co-operation with the Oregon State Game Commission and the U. S. Forest Service.

## Naval Academy Has Vacancy

The First Congressional District of Oregon will have one vacancy at the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland in 1941 and Congressman James W. Mott is anxious that all ambitious young men in his District have an opportunity to try for this coveted appointment.


At the request of Congressman Mott the Civil Service Commission on Saturday, October 5, 1940 will hold a preliminary qualifying examination to determine the eligible candidates in the First Oregon District.

Any young unmarried man, not less than sixteen years of age nor more than twenty years of age on April 1, 1941, may compete.

In order to make the required arrangements it is necessary that applicants notify Congressman James W. Mott, 1532 Howe Office Building, Washington, D. C., not later than September 1, 1940 of their desire to participate in the examination.

Cultivation of weed infestations can start any time during the growing season.
