Western Oregon soils are gaining in fertility each year due to application of an increasing quantity of lime. This Tillamook county lime-spreading scene is typical of similar activity among hundreds of Oregon farmers who are improving their land under the AAA conservation program. In 1936, a total of 2400 tons of lime were applied under the conservation program. In 1939, this figure rose to 13,000 tons.
