From an entertainment standpoint, the 1940 Pacific International Livestock Exposition will reach the highest peak in its history, according to I. B. Wilcox, Jr., who stated that never before has such an array of talent been offered.

First and foremost in the limelight will of course be that well known movie star, Victor McLaglen and his famous light horse troop, comprised of three officers and eighteen men, a total of twenty-two, including Mr. McLaglen. Mr. McLaglen's brother, Cyril, is also a member of the troop.

Second will be a group of outstanding Mexican Charros (cowboys) from Mexico City, giving exhibitions of riding, roping, and many other cowboy feats as carried on in Old Mexico.

Also a third event of high quality will be Major H. E. Tuttle, U.S. A., of the United States Cavalry School, one of the outstanding riders of the U. S. Army, in an exhibition of "Dressage."

And still a fourth event that al-

ways creates much interest will be a thrilling driving competition by 6-Horse Draft Teams.

In addition to these special feature numbers at each performance in the big arena, there will be rapid-fire thrills provided by the Rodeo, and brilliant exhibitions of skill by horsemen and women and their entries in the Horse Show.

Exhibits at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition will include Dairy and Beef Cattle, Horses, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, Pet Stock, Dogs, Land Products, and Industrial Exhibits.

A special exhibit that will create an unusual amount of interest at this time, due to the National Defense Program and war activities in Europe, will be that supplied by the United States War Department.

Officials of the Exposition feel confident that with the marvelous program of entertainment offered, combined with the fine list of exhibits, this year's event will prove to be an outstanding success.
