New Plan to Sell Hides

A new plan for handling unclaimed deer and elk hides held by cold storage and locker plants of the state has been announced by the Oregon State Game Commission. Instead of destroying the hides, the various plants will ship hides to the Portland office for sale to the highest bidder. One-half of the net proceeds will be returned to the plants to reimburse them for handling the skins. Before shipment is made, the plants will first notify the Commission office of the number of hides on hand and state police officers will then check and tag the hides before shipping. In announcing the new plan, the Game Commission makes it clear that any individual has the right to claim the hide of a deer or elk he has killed legally and if properly tagged, he may have it tanned and made up into articles of clothing. No individual has the right, however, to sell or barter such hides.
