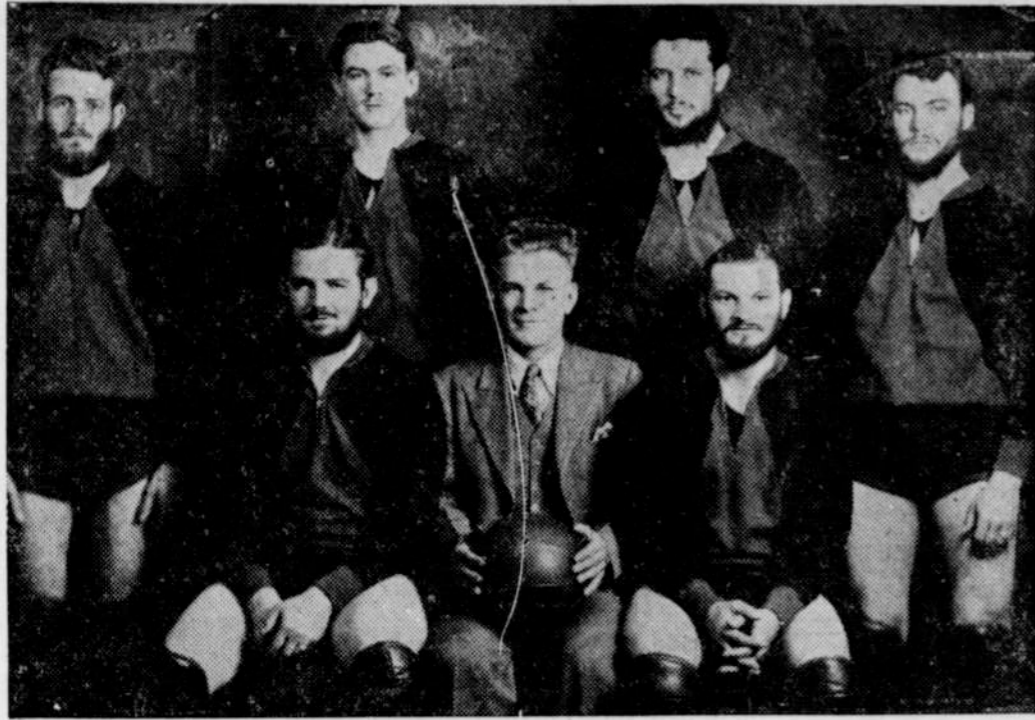

Clever Ball Handling, Comedy to Amuse Fans When Quintet Plays

Basketball fans will witness one of the most entertaining games of the season Sunday, January 26, when the renowned House of David basketball quintet will give the Vernonia IWA competition. The game is set for 8 o'clock on the Washington grade school gym floor, according to Denny Ryves, IWA manager.

The David team was organized by George H. Johnson, the American Association Basketball League umpire for the past 27 years, in 1931 and since that time has toured all western states, Mexico and the provinces of Canada, traveling approximately 22,000 miles and playing 125 games each season. About 90 per cent of the games are placed in the win column.

The team is made up of ex-college stars and has won its way into the ranks of better American basketball attractions. Personnel of the team is as follows:

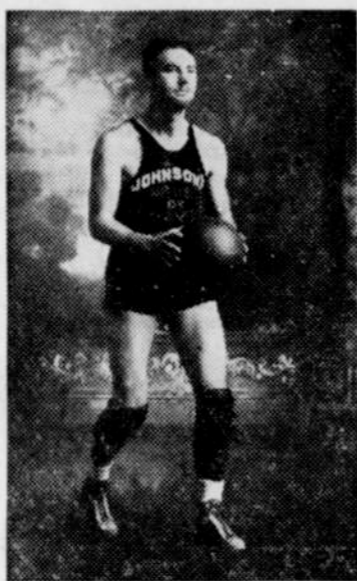
