Besides the safety feature of having tires with good treads during rainy weather, there is a definite economy in getting new tires in winter instead of in summer months. The reason is that new tires dissipate heat slowly due to their new heavy treads, and consequently run hotter and wear faster in summer than in winter. Tests demonstrate that new tires installed during winter months give about one-fourth more mileage than the same type of tires installed in summer.
