

Land Seeding Nearly Done

The seeding of 350 acres of burned-over land in the Clear creek and Rocky Point section is almost completed. George Nelson, county agent, revealed Tuesday. The land is some of that burned last summer by the forest fire starting west of Sunset camp. A portion amounting to 200 acres was seeded last fall and the balance will be completed this week.

Three men working five days can plant a little over 100 acres, it was revealed. Seed supplies were obtained from the Vernonia Trading company. Between six and seven hundred pounds of seed were required to do the work.
