Apply for Permits After June 15

Persons eligible for old age fishing and hunting licenses may apply for them after June 14 when new game laws become effective.

Under the provisions of the bill passed by the legislature, any person over the age of 65 and who has been a resident of the state of Oregon for 10 years or more, who makes an affidavit before a county judge or chairman of a board of county commissioners that he is unable to pay the regular fee, may obtain a special license for fifty cents.

Special affidavit forms have been furnished to all county judges and also may be obtained from the office of the Oregon State Game Commission, 616 Oregon Building, Portland. The fifty-cent fee together with a report on the game and fish taken in the previous seasons, as required by law, must accompany the application.

Over 900 4-H's Sign Green Pledge

Portland, June 11, 1941—More than 900 4-H Club boys and girls of Lane County have signed the Keep Oregon Green pledge and have thus qualified to wear the Keep Oregon Green Junior pin, according to John B. Woods, executive secretary of the association dedicated to keeping forest fires out of the state this year.

The Lane county junior foresters who have pledged support to the campaign are under the leadership of R. C. Kuehner, who has developed one of the outstanding 4-H Club forestry projects in the state.

Pins are now available to give boys and girls in other counties an opportunity to sign the junior pledge and receive buttons. The junior pledge reads:

Seven-Rule Pledge
1. I will be sure my match is out. To be doubly sure, I will break it in two before throwing it away.
2. I will not throw burning material of any kind from the window

of any vehicle, whether moving or standing still.

3. I will not smoke at all in the dry summer woods of Oregon.

4. I will dig down to bare, damp soil before building a campfire. And I will remove all inflammable material from around the fire circle.

5. I will never leave camp before the fire is out—dead out. I will pour water or pack earth over the fire, stirring the coals to make sure no spark is left alive.

6. I will not burn brush or slash in windy weather. I will get a permit from fire warden or ranger before burning.

7. Should I see a fire burning unattended, I will notify the nearest fire warden or ranger. I will act.

NOTICE OF HEARING

Notice is hereby given that in accordance with the provisions of Section 107-404 O. C. L. A., a public meeting of the Columbia County Forest Land Classification Committee will be held at the Court House in St. Helens, Oregon, at 1:30 o'clock p. m., July 10, 1941, for the purpose of holding a public hearing at which time the committee will receive from any interested persons objections, remonstrances or suggestions relating to the proposed classification of certain forest lands in Columbia County, Oregon, said classification to consider Class III or grazing land, the area being specifically described as follows:

Deer and Crooked Creek Grazing Area: Beginning at a point on the Buster Creek CCC truck trail near the one-fourth corner on the west side of Section 30, Township 5 North, Range 5 West; thence in an easterly direction along said truck trail to its junction with the Vernonia-Keasey highway; thence along said highway to its junction with the Mist road; thence along the Mist road to the Black and Wilson Railroad located on the south side

of Crooked Creek; thence in an easterly and northerly direction along said railroad to the point where it crosses the Mist Road on the South side of Section 13; thence along said road to the Turner Mill Road; thence along said Turner Mill Road to a point near the southwest corner of Section 12, Township 5 North, Range 5 West; thence following an old railroad grade in a northwesterly direction through Section 11 to a point in Section 10 on the ridge between Deer Creek and Deep Creek; thence along said ridge in a southerly direction along said truck trail to a point near center of Section 9, Township 5 North, Range 5 West; thence in a westerly direction to the old Kerry Line; thence in a westerly direction to a point where said line intersects the section line between Sections 18 and 19; thence west to the Clatsop-Columbia County line; thence a southerly direction to the point of beginning.

On the basis of presentations made at the hearing the committee will make its final classification of the areas designated hereunder. A statement of the preliminary examination and committee action is available for inspection at the County Court House in St. Helens, Oregon.
