Oregon has one registered motor vehicle for every 2.7 persons residing in the state, it was disclosed today by Earl Snell, secretary of state, who announced a registration of 394,284 vehicles at the end of May.

This registration is an increase of 8.8 per cent above the registration for the same period last year, \$2,873,379 compared to a total of \$2,590,385 for the corresponding period last year.

There were 323,911 private passenger vehicles registered in Oregon at the end of May, compared to 298,139 at the same time last year.

Registration of motor vehicles is expected to exceed the 400,000 mark in Oregon this year, Snell said. The 1940 registration was just 187 vehicles short of 400,000 and at the rate of increase shown to date, it is expected this mark will be passed before the year is over.
