A total of \$800,000 from motor vehicle registrations has been apportioned to Oregon counties on a basis of the motor vehicle registration in each county, Earl Snell, secretary of state, announced today.

The total minimum apportionment for the year is \$2,000,000, of which two-fifths is distributed in July and three-fifths in December.

The July payment of \$800,000 was apportioned on a motor vehicle registration of 400,853 vehicles, which is the first time in the history of the state the number of vehicles has reached the 400,000 mark.

Counties with the heaviest ap-

portionment were Multnomah, Marion, Lane. Following is the number of vehicles registered, and the July apportionment for Columbia county: number of vehicles, 7,253; July payment, \$14,475.13.

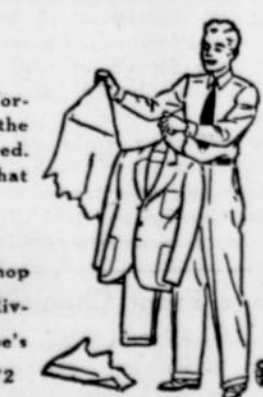
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
