Pedestrians Should Use Crosswalks

Nearly one-fourth the pedestrian fatalities in Oregon involve persons crossing streets between intersections, according to the State Traffic Safety Division.

Virtually all cities today provide marked crosswalks at intersections and even when there are no crosswalks marked, pedestrians should cross only at the intersections, the division emphasizes.

Oregon law provides that drivers must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians occupying a marked crosswalk and if one car has stopped to give the right-of-way to a person walking across the street or road, it is unlawful for another car to pass the stationary vehicle, thus endangering the life of the person on foot.
