This is also written to the Vernonia business men.

Why is it that the Vernonia business men always say "spend your money in your home town." That is a good policy, and should be followed out. But, why don't the business men of this town follow suit and give the young girls in the town a chance to work in their stores. Instead of letting them run wild or do the best they can. They say one needs experience but now is one to gain experience unless one first has a chance to gain some.

Some of the stores do hire the girls and boys and to them a lot of credit is given by the younger set, but what about the others? I have tried unsuccessfully for some time to obtain a position here in Vernonia, but I guess it is hopeless.

Most of the places have married women working. There is nothing wrong with a married woman, whose family needs the money, working. What about the others? Can't their husbands make enough to support them? Are the rest of us going to have to get married before we can obtain a job?

Soon there will be another draft, and the men will all register. If the married women want to work, why don't they let their husbands go help Uncle Sam? He needs them, if they don't. Maybe then some of us can obtain jobs.

Some of the boys and girls who graduate from Vernonia High aren't able to go on to college. What are they supposed to do?

The boys are somewhat lucky. They can usually obtain a position in the mill or logging camps.

But, what about the girls? Most of the girls want to work instead of getting married, I think. And they would rather stay in their home town where they know the people instead of working in an unfamiliar place. Of course, all the girls couldn't obtain work, but, if the merchants would give more of them a chance it would help a lot of them.

Thank all of you who read this, and I hope what I wrote will make some of the people in Vernonia think more about the young, jobless girls.

List of Vehicles Govern Tire Release Committee

Following the ratification last week by Governor Charles A. Sprague of the committee which will govern the release of new tires and tubes to citizens of this vicinity, the following rules are being published to clarify the vehicles to which releases may be made. Committee members are Mrs. J. C. Lincoln, Loel Roberts and Elmore Knight.

List of vehicles which may be equipped with new rubber tires, casings or tubes.

No certificate shall be issued unless applicant for the certificate certifies that the tire, casing or tube for which application is made is to be mounted:

(a) On a vehicle which is operated by a physician, surgeon, visiting nurse, veterinarian and which is used principally for professional services.

(b) On an ambulance.

(c) On a vehicle used exclusively for one or more of the following purposes:

1. Maintain fire fighting services.
2. Maintain necessary public police services.
3. To enforce such laws as relate specifically to protection of public health and safety.
4. Maintain garbage disposal and other sanitation services.
5. Maintain mail services.

(d) On a vehicle with a capacity of 10 or more passengers operated exclusively for one or more of the following purposes:

1. Transportation of passengers as part of the services rendered to the public, by a regular transportation system.
2. Transportation of students and teachers to and from school.
3. Transportation of employees to and from any industrial or mining establishment or construction project, except when public transportation facilities are readily available.
4. Transportation of material and equipment for construction and maintenance of production facilities.
5. Transportation of material and equipment for construction of defense housing facilities and military and naval establishments.
6. Transportation essential to render roofing, plumbing, heating and electrical repair services.
7. Transportation by any common carrier.
8. Transportation of waste and scrap material.

(e) On a truck operated exclusively for one or more of the purposes stated in the preceding section for one or more of the following purposes:

1. Transportation of ice and fuel.
2. Transportation of material and equipment for the building and maintenance of public roads.
3. Transportation of material and equipment for construction and maintenance of public utilities.
4. Transportation of material and equipment for construction and maintenance of production facilities.
5. Transportation of material and equipment for construction of defense housing facilities and military and naval establishments.
6. Transportation essential to render roofing, plumbing, heating and electrical repair services.
7. Transportation by any common carrier.
8. Transportation of waste and scrap material.

certificate shall be issued for a new tire or tube to be mounted on a truck used (a) for the transportation of commodities to ultimate consumer for personal, family or household use; or (b) for transportation of materials for construction and maintenance except to the extent specifically provided by subsections 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 of this section (e).

(f) On farm tractors or other farm implements other than automobiles or trucks for the operation of which rubber tires, casings or tubes are essential.

(g) On industrial, mining and construction equipment other than automobile or trucks for the operation of which rubber tires, casings or tubes are essential.
