4-H Clubs Launch Victory Plan

Oregon 4-H clubs are undertaking a seven-point victory program based on civilian defense needs, H. C. Seymour, state club leader in the O. S. C. extension service, has just announced. The program is a wartime revision of a similar one which the 25,000 Oregon 4-H club members and the 3000 local club leaders have been conducting for more than a year.

The seven points are (1) interpreting to the community the four freedoms; (2) producing and conserving needed foods in 4-H club projects; (3) saving for victory—prevention of waste; (4) developing individual and community health; (5) learning useful skills and volunteering for civilian defense work; (6) practicing democratic procedure; and (7) participating in discussion groups and other organized community activities.
