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Cigarette Tossing Cause of Alert

Charles P. Pray, state superintendent of police has on hand statistics of interest to the Oregon motorists who may want to know why enforcement officers are on the alert for the cigarette flipper during the current fire season.

The Oregon police were always mindful of the need for enforcing the forest code which restricts the throwing away of burning materials," Superintendent Pray declared, "but it took statistics to drive home the dire need for the fire prevention measure and the importance of its enforcement."

The statistics which has so impressed the state's No. 1 enforcement officer gave convincing proof that the cigarette, thrown carelessly aside, is a major cause of roadside fire which may spread to farm, field and forest.

Studies Revealed Facts
 Here are the facts—Bureau of Standards studies show that cigarettes are consumed to an average length of one and one quarter inch above the critical point. They then burn eight and one-half to twelve minutes, and six out of nine burn full length. When tossed on dried grass pad, 85.3 per cent of the cigarettes ignited the grass. On Douglas fir duff in the forests of western Washington, 20 tests set 19 fires. On rotted Douglas fir wood, 19 tests set five fires, let it go out alone."
