

Vernonia Affected By Dim-Out Active Aug. 20

Lieutenant General J. L. DeWitt August 5 ordered all types of lighting extinguished or controlled along the entire Pacific Coast from Canada to Mexico, as far inland in some places as 150 miles, for the duration of the war. The proclamation announced yesterday becomes effective August 20.

The order, issued by the Commanding General of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army under Public Proclamation No. 10, was directed to residents of California, Oregon and Washington and set up a zone of restricted lighting in those three states.

The Civilian Defense Board of the Ninth Regional Office of Civilian Defense is designated in the proclamation as the primary agency to aid in the enforcement of the provisions of the order. Civil law enforcement agencies in the three coastal states are requested to assist the Civilian Defense Board in this enforcement. The proclamation is aimed at controlling lighting which throws beams upward or is visible from the ocean in the newly established Zone of Restricted Lighting.

Covers Many Lights

The proclamation, as issued by General DeWitt, covers signs, commercial flood lighting, display lighting and amusement places; ground areas and industrial illumination; traffic signals and signs; navigation lights and railroad signals; street and highway lights, street and highway traffic; residential, commercial and industrial windows and necessary industrial fires.

Illuminated signs and ornamental lighting of every description which are visible out of doors, and floodlighting which illuminates buildings or signs including but not limited to all exterior advertising signs, billboards, display lighting, theatre marquee signs, building outline lighting, and interior signs and ornamental lighting immediately within unobscured window areas, shall be extinguished, the Proclamation states. This is not intended to prohibit ordinary store show-window lighting of normal intensity, if not visible from the sea and if no light is emitted upward.

Allows Little Light

Illumination on all outdoor ground areas, including automobile service station yards, outdoor parking areas, recreation areas, and entrances to buildings shall not exceed one foot candle at any point, and all outdoor light sources shall be shielded that no light is emitted upward. All light sources for industrial and protective purposes and light from essential industrial processes, shall be shielded or revised to as great an extent as may be practicable in order to eliminate

or reduce to a minimum the amount of light which is emitted upward.

All illuminated signs or signals which are authorized or maintained by governmental authority for the purpose of controlling street or highway traffic shall remain in operation, but shall be so shielded that no light is emitted upward. Authorized lights to facilitate air or water navigation, and authorized railroad signal lights, are excepted from all the provisions of the Proclamation.

Must Shield Street Lights

Street and highway lights in areas which are normally visible from the sea shall be so shielded that they are not visible from the sea at night and so that no light is emitted upward.

No lighting shall be permitted behind windows or glazed doors visible from the sea unless they are covered by drapes or shades.

No vehicle shall operate during the night hours between sunset and sunrise within areas of travel visible from the sea, with more than two lighted driving lamps, regardless of the direction of travel. Each such lamp shall provide a maximum of not more than 250 beam candlepower.

The Proclamation does not restrict the use of normal rear lights including taillights, stop lights and license plate lights. Neither are clearance lights restricted on commercial vehicles that are normally required by law to be so equipped.

Must Not Show

All light from industrial processes, and from industrial fires, such as lights from kilns, refuse burners, and furnaces, visible from the sea, shall be so shielded that they are not visible from the sea at night, and so that no light is emitted upward. Except for traffic signals and navigation and railroad signal lights, considered separately, the Proclamation prohibits all other lights visible from the sea at night including light from fires, bonfires, parked cars, flashlights and lanterns.

The area affected in the Zone of Restricted Lighting, includes all or portions of, 49 counties in California, 14 counties in Oregon and 18 counties in Washington.

Counties Affected

Complete counties affected in Oregon include Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Washington, Yamhill, Polk, Lincoln, Coos, and Curry.

Following the effective date of the Proclamation, exhaustive tests will be made of the Zone from the land, sea and sky. With the complete cooperation of the Army, Navy, Fourth Air Force and the Office of Civilian Defense, the entire coast line will be surveyed to determine the effectiveness of the dim out and what corrective measures must be taken to secure the results intended.

How to keep cooking from spoiling your vacation

Some time-saving ideas suggested by the Safeway Homemakers' Bureau.

VACATION MENU
Baked Ham Loaf—Served Hot or Cold
(Mix and mold meat in advance; keep in refrigerator until ready to bake.)

Scalloped Noodles
(Cook noodles; combine with hot cream sauce; keep in refrigerator until time to bake; dot with buttered crumbs and brown in oven.)

Buttered Freshly-Cooked Peas
(Shell and cook just before serving)
Sliced Tomato, Grapefruit Section, and Avocado Ring Salad with French Dressing
(Keep scalded tomatoes in refrigerator ready to peel; prepare salad at the last)

Heated Rolls Butter
Fresh Peaches and Cream
(Slice fruit just before serving)
Oatmeal Cookies
(Baked in an ambitious moment)
Coffee, Milk, or Iced Tea
