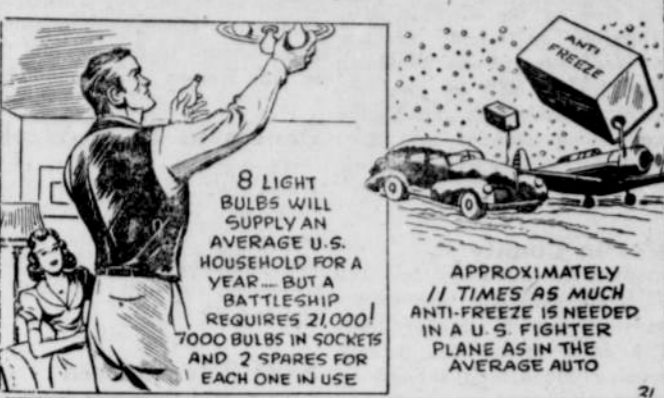

Mrs. America Meets the War

Mrs. America's home will be as bright as ever despite a simplification order decreasing the number of types of bulbs manufactured. Adequate supplies of the permitted types of bulbs will be produced to make up for the discontinued lines. The common household electric light bulbs previously made in voltages of 110, 115, 120, 125 and 130 now will be made only in the 115, 120 and 125 volt types. Since lamps in wattages of 15, 25, 40, 60 and 100 will still be satisfactory, 50 and 75 watt lamps no longer will be made, and there also will be a reduction in the number of colors used. The simplification order reducing the types of bulbs made from 3500 to 1700 will save about 650 tons of steel, 35,000 pounds of solder and 8,000 pounds of tungsten.

And in line with the trend towards simplification, soon Mrs. America won't be finding the variety of shapes and sizes of glass containers on her grocer's shelves. The glass containers used for packing foods and other commodities are expected to follow standard designs. Wines, jellies and preserves already have been added to the products for which the WPB requires the use of standardized bottles. The simplification of bottle designs will save considerable amounts of glass-making materials and make available more glass containers needed to fill in the gap left by vanishing tin cans.

If your young son finds model airplanes hard to get, remind him the materials which go into their manufacture are war recruits too. The model planes have been made of light balsa wood, which grows in South America but this has become a precious war material. Balsa wood goes into the real planes, and not just toys. It is used as a substitute for light metals in aircraft production, going into trainer planes. Likewise it is made into life floats.

Large hats may be a bit difficult for milady to wear while riding on street cars and buses in the future if the "standsit seat" is adopted. The "standsit seat", you see, is being studied as a means of increasing the seating capacity of buses and street cars because of the small amount of space it requires. The regular seats are spaced from 28 to 32 inches apart, but the "standsit seats" are located only 18 inches apart. "Standsit Seats" are being tried out as an experiment, but if this type of seat is adopted, you can see that a picture hat might be out of place on the trolley or bus.

When the winter winds blow, you can thank the OPA for price ceilings on winter underwear. Ceiling prices have been set on 12 categories of knitted underwear, including sleeping garments, for men, women and children. Goods of cotton, wool and mixed fibres come under the regulation. And you can be sure that you'll be getting your money's worth for standards have been set up as a part of the price regulation to prevent any deterioration of quality.

Some time before Christmas you may receive war ration book No. 2. It is referred to as an "all-purpose" ration book and it is designed to provide a swift means for rationing any article or commodity almost at the instant the danger of a critical short-gone appears. The book has just gone to the printer, and it isn't expected that it will be ready for distribution until just before Christmas. Incidentally, the OPA has rules that it is illegal for a person to possess a ration book not issued to him or to make use of one to which he is not entitled.
