

## Mrs. America Meets the War

New shopping habits are ahead for Mrs. America when point rationing of processed foods is introduced sometime in February with the use of War Ration Book Two. The new system of rationing will mean budgeting of points as well as money for American homemakers and apparently it will result in less impulsive buying since a given amount of points must last over the ration period. Canned, bottled and frozen fruits and vegetables, fruit and vegetable juices, dried fruits and all canned soup will be included in the new rationing program. Through the new system of rationing, low point values will be given to foods which are relatively plentiful while high values will be given to those that are most scarce. Since housewives will be able to get more for points by buying foods with low point values, it is expected that the demand will be relieved for the very scarce goods.

If you're shopping for a used vacuum cleaner, you're lucky because the office of price administration has safeguarded you from paying inflated prices. A new price regulation resulted in an average reduction of four to five dollars for most models of used cleaners than had been charged before it became effective on January 7. The regulation also sets up a standard which must be met by sellers of rebuilt machines. All rebuilt machines must have a one-year guarantee, according to the regulation.

Time will tell but indications are that Mrs. America's search for an alarm clock may soon produce a Victory model. Since the manufacture of alarm clocks was prohibited by a war production board order, members of the industry have met with government officials to study the WPB suggestion for a Victory model. This would be designed to use the least amount of copper and brass in movement parts, and a non-metal case. But Mrs. America may not be so lucky once the present supply of wrist watches is gone. Neither wrist watches nor pocket watches have been considered with

the same concern as the alarm clock. Should the manufacture of watches be resumed at all it would probably be only to use the present inventories of movement parts.

Although sewing machines have gone to war, there's a pretty good chance of keeping those on hand in good condition. There has been an extension of production of repair parts for domestic sewing machines by the war production board and needles are included.

If any meal-planners are laboring under the impression that existing meat shortages in various parts of the country are due to the amounts being sent to our British and Russian allies, President Roosevelt's report to congress on lend-lease operations certainly should correct that mistaken idea. Rather it is the need of our own armed forces increasing meat demands of harder-working, higher paid private citizens that is responsible for cutting our meat supply thinner at home. The president's lend-lease report revealed that more than 99 per cent of our year's supply of beef, lamb and mutton has been kept right at home for civilians or sent to our armed forces here or abroad. Eighty-seven per cent of the year's pork supply has gone for our own use with the remaining 13 per cent exported to our allies. But the increase in pork production was sufficient to take care of exports and still provide a normal supply. However, fighting men eat twice as much meat as civilians.

Housewives taking in roomers may evict an undesirable tenant without permission of the government rent officials if they rent to not more than two paying guests. This amendment to the federal rent control regulation was made effective to cooperate with the war guest program of the national housing agency which is trying to provide rooms in private homes in areas suffering from housing shortage. Formerly many homeowners have been reluctant to rent rooms because of the strict OPA requirements for eviction.

Lamps that dot the average American home—table models, floor lamps, bed lamps—are blinking out for the duration as long as they contain critical materials. A war

## Tentative 1943 Angling Regulations Considered

Following is a summary of the angling regulations tentatively considered by the game commission for the 1943 season at its meeting on January 9 held in Portland.

In order that the contemplated regulations could be publicized before final action was taken, the meeting was adjourned to January 30 at which time the commission formally will adopt them. The new regulations will not be effective until the final order has been made and a copy filed with the secretary of state.

### TENTATIVE ANGLING REGULATIONS FOR 1943

#### TROUT 6 INCHES OR OVER (Including Salmon and steelhead under 20")

Open season: April 17 to October 31; except that the season is open May 1 to October 31 in Baker, Grant, Harney, Klamath, Lake, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Wheeler and Malheur counties.

Bag Limit: 15 fish or 15 pounds and 1 fish in any 1 day, but not to exceed 30 fish or 30 pounds and 2 fish in any 7 consecutive days or in possession at any one time.

#### TROUT TEN INCHES OR OVER (Including Salmon and Steelhead under 20")

Open Season: Entire year in following waters:

Bays, inlets and tidewaters of Pacific Ocean.  
Below and above tidewater on all coastal streams except those closed or having specified seasons.  
Tahkenitch, Siltcoos, Ten Mile, Mercer, Sutton, Devils, Floras, Garrison lakes.  
Clackamas river from its mouth

production board order, effective immediately, restricts the use of critical materials in portable electric lamps and wire frames for shades. Until this action production of lamps and shades had been limited to 60 per cent of the 1940 output. However, even so it was reported that manufacturers were able to get and use copper wire and other materials.

to a point 1 mile below River Mill dam, exclusive of its tributaries.

Bull Run river from its mouth to a point 300 feet below the power house, exclusive of its tributaries.

Fifteen Mile creek from a point 200 feet above Seufert dam to its confluence with Eight Mile creek.

Sandy river from its mouth to Marmot dam, exclusive of its tributaries.

South Umpqua river from its mouth to Jackson creek, exclusive of its tributaries.

North Umpqua river from its mouth to the narrows, exclusive of its tributaries.

Bag limit:  
From November 1 to April 16, bag limit is 3 fish a day but not more than 6 in any 7 consecutive days or in possession at any one time.

Remainder of the year bag limit is to be counted with and as part of the bag limit for trout six inches or over.

#### SALMON AND STEELHEAD 20 INCHES OR OVER

Open season:  
Entire year in entire state. (Exceptions listed by counties)

Bag limit:  
5 fish a day but not more than 10 fish in possession.

(Note: Below are the special regulations which apply to Columbia and immediately surrounding counties.)

#### CLATSOP COUNTY

##### SPECIAL SEASONS:

That part of Rock creek (a tributary of Nehalem river) above the deadline approximately 200 feet below the Keasey dam, June 1 to October 31, inclusive; provided, this open season shall apply also to steelhead, salmon and trout not less than 10 inches in length.

That part of the Necanicum river and its tributaries above the second coast highway bridge south of Seaside, June 1 to October 31, inclusive; provided, this open season shall apply also to steelhead, salmon and trout not less than 10 inches in length.

CLOSED TO ALL ANGLING:  
Humbog creek (a tributary to the Nehalem river) and its tributaries.  
All tributaries of Fish Hawk creek (a tributary to the Nehalem river and originating in Section 17, Township 6 North, Range 5 West).

#### COLUMBIA COUNTY

##### SPECIAL SEASONS:

That part of the Nehalem river and its tributaries from its confluence with Rock creek near Vernonia upstream to its confluence with Wolf creek, June 1 to October 31, inclusive; provided, this open season shall apply also to steelhead, salmon and trout not less than 10 inches in length.

That part of Rock creek (a tributary of the Nehalem river) above the deadline approximately 200 feet below Keasey dam, June 1 to October 31 inclusive; provided, this open season shall apply also to steelhead, salmon and trout not less than 10 inches in length.

That part of Milton creek between Taylor's dam and its source shall be open to angling for steelhead, salmon and trout not less than 10 inches in length from April 18 to October 31, inclusive, only.

##### CLOSED TO ALL ANGLING:

All tributaries of Fish Hawk creek (a tributary of the Nehalem river and originating in Section 17, Township 6 North, Range 5 West).  
Oak Ranch creek (a tributary of the Nehalem river) and its tributaries.

Tide creek from its mouth up to the first falls in said stream.

All tributaries of Rock creek (a tributary of the Nehalem river.)

All tributaries of the Clatskanie river above the mouth of Conyers creek.

All tributaries of Beaver creek (a tributary of the Clatskanie river.)

#### TILLAMOOK COUNTY

##### SPECIAL SEASONS:

That part of the Nestucca river above the fifth bridge across said river above the town of Beaver, June 1 to October 31, inclusive; provided, that this open season shall apply also to steelhead, salmon and trout not less than 10 inches in length.

Hebo lake, June 1 to July 15, inclusive.

That part of Salmon river above

#### WASHINGTON COUNTY

##### SPECIAL SEASONS:

That part of the Nehalem river and its tributaries from its confluence with Rock creek near Vernonia up to its confluence with Wolf creek, June 1 to October 31, inclusive; provided that this open season shall apply also to steelhead, salmon and trout not less than 10 inches in length.

### CLOSED TO ALL ANGLING:

That part of the Nehalem river and its tributaries above and including Wolf creek.
