Civil Service Has Four New Jobs

Four new civilian war service jobs were announced last week by the United States civil service commission, O. T. Bateman, local secretary reported. All contribute directly or indirectly to the war effort. Appointees for the positions of crop production specialists, junior soil conservationist and historical specialists will be selected on the basis of previous training and experience.

College Study Required
The position of junior soil conservationists requires applicants with appropriate college study to do work in forestry, range and soil conservation, and soil surveying. Salaries are \$2,000 a year (plus additional compensation for overtime).

Historical specialists are needed to select and preserve records significant not merely for future reference but also for the immediate conduct of the war. College trained people who have done appropriate work in history or in one or more of the social sciences are sought. Salaries are from \$2,600 to \$6,500 a year (plus additional compensation for overtime).

Written Test Required
A written test for women printer's assistants will be given in Portland, Mr. Bateman announced, to fill positions in the Bureau of Engraving and Printing of the treasury department, Washington, D.C. No previous experience is required for jobs that pay on an average of \$1,790 a year and offer opportunities for advancement for women in sound physical health. Complete information about these positions may be obtained from Mr. Bateman at the local post office.
